


Let it Growby Mary Ann Fraser

Fun Facts:

- Scientifically speaking, pumpkins are a fruit (they contain seeds) but when it comes to cooking, they are often referred to as vegetables.
- Pumpkins likely originated in North and Central America. They were then spread across all Europe and elsewhere. People discovered the oldest pumpkin seeds in the Oaxaca Highlands of Mexico. They date back to around 7000 BC!
- A grower in Italy holds the world record for heaviest pumpkin. He grew a *2,702-pound squash* in 2021, according to Guinness World Records.
- It takes up to 120 days to produce a mature carving pumpkin. Pumpkins need a long growing season. They get planted in late May in the northern states and early July in the southern states. Each pumpkin can contain up to 500 pumpkin seeds.
- In the United States, Illinois is the largest producer of pumpkins.
- Georgia only produces a few hundred acres of pumpkins, and an estimated 80 to 90 percent of those are grown in north Georgia.
