Fun Facts:

- August is National Family Fun Month. The average high in middle Georgia is 91 degrees and the average low is 70 degrees-good weather to get outside and participate in the Great Pollinator Census.
- The Great Pollinator Census is August 20 and 21, 2021. All across our state people will count insects that land on a favorite pollinator plant for 15 minutes and then report those numbers on-line.
- Flies, wasps, beetles, butterflies, and moths are also important pollinators, but native bees are especially effective crop pollinators for a variety of reasons. Georgia has more than 500 native bee specie, the vast majority of which are solitary in nature.
- For the state of Georgia the annual economic value of pollinators is \$367 million!
