


Thank a Farmer By Maria Gianferrari

Fun Facts:

- Georgia's top 10 commodities: 1. Broilers: \$5.8 billion, 2. Eggs: \$988 million, 3. Beef: \$981.7 million, 4. Cotton: \$938.6 million, 5. Peanuts: \$915 million, 6. Timber: \$885.8 million, 7. Greenhouse: \$585 million, 8. Blueberries: \$526.6 million, 9. Corn: \$514 million, 10. Dairy: \$456.1 million
- Georgia commodities directly represent a value of over \$17.6 billion to the state's economy. In 2023, food and fiber production and related industries contributed \$91.4 billion in output to Georgia's \$1.4 trillion economy and more than 381,200 jobs.
- Georgia has around 42,000 farms and approximately 9.6 million acres of land in agricultural production.
- The average age of a Georgia farmer is around 58 years old. This is similar to the national average.
- Agriculture is Georgia's largest industry and contributes more than \$74 billion to the state's economy each year!
- In Georgia, 9,953,730 acres of land is used by farms and the average farm size is 235 acres.
- Harvested cropland accounts for 3,628,707 acres.

Activities:

- Farm-City Week is November 19-26! Celebrate by having students write <u>thank you letters or postcards</u> to farmers. Check with your local Farm Bureau for the submission deadline—they'll handle delivery!
- Fall is a busy time for farmers, and it brings in several holidays that wouldn't happen without farmers! We have several "It starts on the farm" printables to highlight the connection between farms and holidays- Halloween * Thanksgiving
- Recipes: No Bake Recipe Bank- cook with a commodity that is grown in your county or school garden
- Plant or transplant the following: beets, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, collards, lettuce, mustard, onions, radishes, spinach, and turnips. Plant your second planting of fall crops such as collards, turnips, cabbage, mustard, and kale.
